Marvin Summerford received his high school diploma at age 82 from Superintendent Robert Hassler at North Penn High School.

The residents and staff of Lamb Foundation often enjoyed listening to Marvin Summerford's stories of Pearl Harbor and how he had been in town at the time the bombs were dropped.

Marvin left school to go to war and though he returned home, he never had a chance to go back to school.

A Lamb resident for about eight years, Marvin recently left Lamb for more supervised care at Silver Stream Nursing Home. His daily presence is missed, and friends from Lamb visit him frequently.

"I had the opportunity to confer his diploma to him under the Diplomas for Veterans

Bill," says Donna Mengel Lamb Foundation director. The bill allowed students that left the classroom for war to receive a high school diploma. In June 2002, Marvin was in North Penn High School's first graduating class after the bill was passed.

Marvin was a great reader of the Bible and every night would lead the evening grace before the meal in his home. Because many of his friends at Lamb can't read, he used his abilities to read their mail to them. And, although his physical limitations meant that he couldn't move quickly, he was a great lover of nature, especially birds. Sitting outside at Lamb, he could identify birds by their songs.

"What I remember most about Marvin is that he was very kind, very respectful, he appreciated everything, he was very mannerly, and he was very pleasant," says his former house manager Dolly Dancha.
